## Curriculum Intent

For our pupils to develop a sense of security, belonging and purpose within the school community and their local communities. Participating in enriching and meaningful experiences to equip them with the knowledge and confidence to transfer their skills to wider community settings.

Our priorities are:

- For pupils to better understand their place in the world around them.
- For pupils to be confident in accessing their place in the world around them.
- For pupils to be confident in accessing and understanding different environments.
- For pupils to celebrate their successes, and those of others, together in the community.

## Curriculum Implementation

### Key Components and Strands

The curriculum at the Westminster School is made up of six Areas of Learning. Each Area of Learning has 2 or 3 key Components, which encompass a number of Strands. Each strand is then broken down into key priorities of learning which are then used to support the planning and delivery of high-quality teaching and learning.

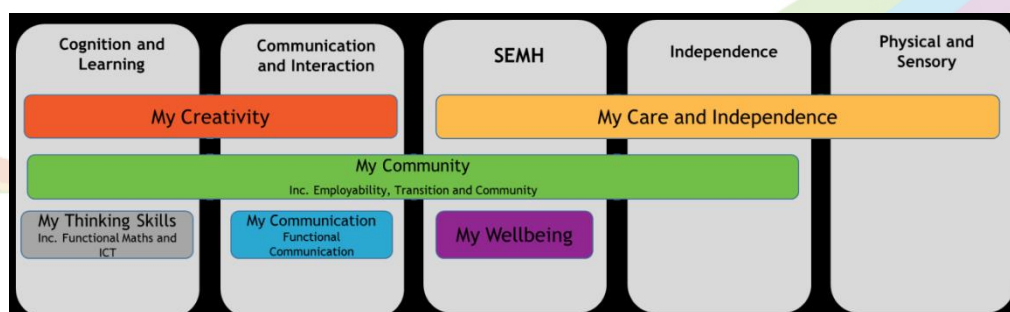

- Sensory and/or physical needs.

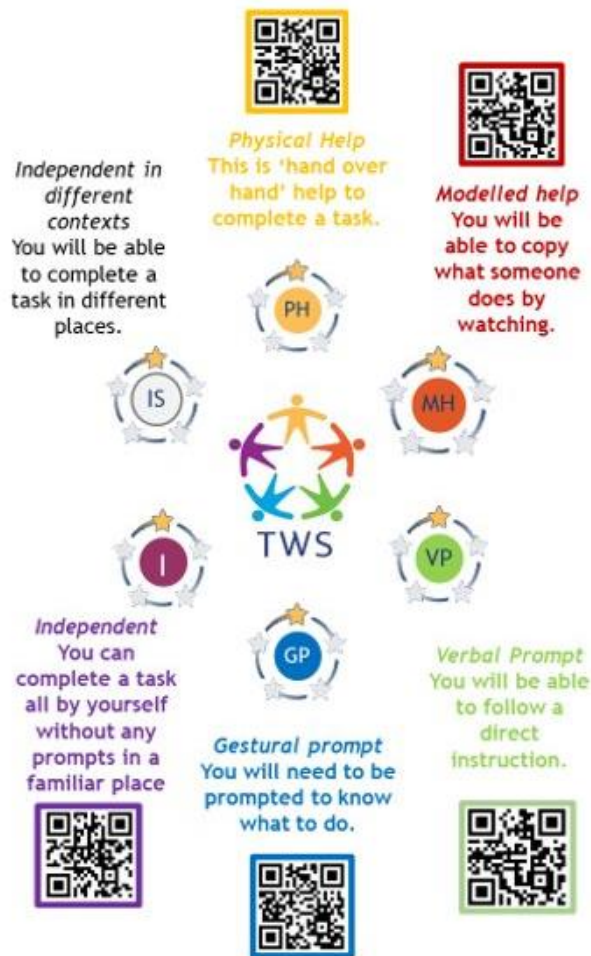
